- Real leaders know the difference between character and integrity, and why it takes both to succeed.


Germs At Work

Germs are everywhere. And though most of them won't kill you, nobody likes the thought of exposure to a potentially serious disease, or just wallowing in general yuckiness at work. You probably can't wear a hazmat suit to the office, so follow this advice for fighting off the germs and bacteria lying in wait for you at your workplace:

- Wash your hands often. Don't just dash them under the faucet for a few moments. Spend at least 20 seconds with soap and running water to eliminate germs you may have picked up. Hand sanitizer will help in a pinch, but it's not considered as effective.
- **Disinfect your workspace.** Wipe down your desktop with some disinfectant. Clean your phone, your computer mouse, and your keyboard (check with IT on the safest method). Throw out any old food hiding in corners or drawers.
- Watch out for common surfaces. The copier...the fax machine...the microwave door handle...elevator buttons...light switches...even the office doorknob can retain potentially infectious germs. Disinfect them when you can; use paper towels on faucet handles in the bathroom if possible, and use your knuckle, not your fingertip, on buttons and light switches.
- **Stay home.** If you're sick, don't go to work and spread your germs. Do yourself and your colleagues a favor and work from home or take a sick day to avoid exposing others to disease.

Auto Accessories That Just Didn't Make The Cut

James Bond's cars come equipped with ejector seats and machine guns. Real-life automakers have been similarly creative with accessories, though not all of them have stood the test of time. A leading insurance company website notes three of the more unusual variations that autos have sported at one time or another:

- **The record player.** The 1956 Chrysler, DeSoto, Dodge and Plymouth models offered an optional turntable that slid out from beneath the dashboard to play drivers' vinyl records at the touch of a button.
- **The third headlight.** The 1948 Tucker Sedan sported an additional headlight in the center of its hood, capable of swiveling along with the car's steering wheel for improved visibility when turning corners. Only 51 of the sedans were ever built, and the extra headlight had to be hidden behind a cover because of laws in 17 states prohibiting more than two headlights on cars.
- **The invisible gas cap.** For a more streamlined look, some carmakers tried hiding fuel caps behind taillights and rear license plates; the 1956 Chevy Bel Air featured a rear headlight that would flip down to reveal the gas cap. The practice was discontinued when safety experts pointed out that in a rear-end collision, even a small bump could create a dangerous gasoline leak.

Another Reason Not To Skip Your Workout: Brain Health

Exercise is good for your body, of course. But it may keep your brain healthy as well, especially as you grow older.

A study of more than 600 older people (average age 74) found that those who exercised three or more times a week for 30 minutes at a time were about 40% less likely to develop vascular dementia (associated with reduced flow of blood to the brain) than those who weren't as physically active.

Exercise didn't appear to have any impact on the subjects' risk of Alzheimer's disease, which is just one specific form of dementia, but those who did work out were generally less likely to develop difficulties with their thought processes.

Discover What Drives You

What kind of motivation do you respond to best? The answer can guide you toward the success you're seeking. Here's a simple test that experts in neurolinguistic programming (NLP) frequently use:

Imagine that you've just won the lottery and you'll never have to work again. Which of the following descriptions would apply most closely to you?


A. You feel safe and secure. You have everything you need to be comfortable and free of worries. You don't have to do anything you don't want to. You can make most of your problems go away easily.

B. You can do whatever you want. You can buy your favorite car, live any place, and go anywhere you've ever dreamed of. Any goal you've ever thought about is now within reach.

If "A" feels most accurate, you have what NLP gurus call an "away-from" personality. You're motivated to avoid negative outcomes, which can help you manage obstacles and plan for problems, although you may not be drawn toward grand, challenging goals.

If "B" describes you better, you have a "toward" personality. You're driven by achievement, but you don't necessarily deal effectively with details or organize your campaign well.

Both personality types have pros and cons, and most people have a little bit of both. But knowing which fits can help you decide what will work best when you're setting goals and striving for success.


